Property Purchase to Become Public Plaza

EPCIC Acquires Former PNC Bank Drive-Through Lot

The East Palestine Community Improvement Corporation (EPCIC), a non-profit organization created to support the economic development of the Village of East Palestine, acquired 74 North Market St. (the former PNC Bank drive-through lot) in December of last year.

The property was purchased so that it can eventually be turned into a public plaza for the benefit of the community as part of a planned downtown revitalization effort. There are examples in the region of appealing, vibrant downtowns that become drivers for business and population growth. East Palestine seeks to do the same. Having a public gathering space can be

important to communities whether it's used for friends meeting on a park bench to chat over coffee, a greenspace for kids and pets, a musical performance on a summer evening or the center of a community festival.

"A key component of the economic recovery plan for the village is downtown revitalization," said EPCIC President Chris Page. "This property in the center of the downtown will eventually become a key gathering space for events, performances and celebrations. We still have a lot of work to do to develop the plaza and revitalize the downtown, but securing this property

The Village of East Palestine Council is made up of six elected members, serving overlapping terms of four years. Whenever there are vacancies, new members are appointed to fill the open positions.

Barb Herriott was appointed to fill the open council member seat left by Doug Simpson's resignation at the East Palestine Village Council meeting on November 25. She will serve out the remainder of the term until 12/31/2025. Barb was also appointed as the new Board Member to fill the open position left by Linda May on the East Palestine Community Improvement Corporation (EPCIC).

A resident of East Palestine for over 27 years, Herriott recently retired after a 45 ½ year career at The East Fairfield Coal Co., aka The East Fairfield Stone Co. There she served in a variety of roles including Human Resources Manager; Mine Safety and Health Administration Certified Instructor; managed the trucking division; maintained inventory and royalty records for each mine; as well as completed several high-visibility special projects for the company.

Barb notes, "East Palestine has a lot to offer. I believe in trying to improve my community and would like to help my hometown any way possible."

John Simon was appointed to fill the open council member seat left by Linda May's passing at the East Palestine Village Council meeting on December 30. He will serve out the term through 12/31/2027.

John has been a resident of East Palestine for 39 years, and works as a civil engineer in Pittsburgh, PA. In his current role, he has worked with several government agencies on projects in Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. He has also served as the President of the East Palestine Youth Sports Association for the last 10 years.

Linda May Remembered

East Palestine has lost a leader, advocate and friend with the unexpected passing of councilmember **Linda May** in her home on Dec. 9, 2024. Following Linda's wishes, a celebration of life will be announced by her family at a later date.

Born Jan. 13, 1950, in Salem, Ohio, the daughter of Howard and Louise Smith May, May spent a career in education before devoting her time to civic duties. She was a graduate of East Palestine High School

and Ohio State University, where she earned a Bachelor in Education before continuing her postgraduate studies at Youngstown State. She returned to East Palestine as a social studies and history teacher for East Palestine Schools, teaching for several years and later working as consultant for the Ohio Education Association.

In January of 2022, May was called to public service and was appointed to fill an empty seat on council. When that term expired, she was re-elected in November of 2023. As a member of council, May helped lead the village through last year's Norfolk Southern train derailment, focusing on rebranding the

village and fostering economic development to not just move East Palestine past the derailment but forward into a future of prosperity.

May served on the Park and Recreation, Street and Development/Finance Committees, the latter of which she chaired. May took her chair role seriously, advocating for the economic health of East Palestine through relationships she forged with the Columbiana County Port Authority and the Greater Lakes Rural Community Action Partnership (RCAP). May was a member of the village's economic steering committee and helped establish the village Think Tank – a group dedicated to fostering economic growth in the village. It was through her work with the Think Tank that May created dialogue between residents, business owners and the village leaders — giving a voice to the community and allowing residents a say in development direction. She was instrumental in the creation of the East Palestine Community Improvement Corporation and served as a board member where she was in constant contact with state and federal officials to leave no stone unturned and no resource untapped when it came to the village's economic recovery.

"The loss of Linda is immeasurable," council clerk and acting village manager **Misti Martin** said. "She cared deeply for the community and worked tirelessly to make East Palestine a better place now and in the future. She will be greatly missed by all."

was a critical first step. The EPCIC is extremely grateful for the sponsors of the Brighten Our Future Campaign that allowed us to buy this property. We have a plan, we are collaborating, and we are action-oriented."

Since it first met in March of 2024, the EPCIC has been working to improve the image of East Palestine through various public relations and marketing efforts. For downtown revitalization efforts, the EPCIC obtained an Opportunity Appalachia Grant to develop a plan for repurposing the old freight depot off of Taggart Street. It has also been working with the Village on the Safe Streets for All planning grant that should help secure future grant funds for elements of a streetscape, for instance: improved sidewalks, decorative streetlights, planters, benches, burying utility lines and pedestrian safety measures.

The EPCIC extends its heartfelt appreciation to all who supported the Brighten Our Future campaign. More sponsors were added after the publication of the December newsletter, bringing the total raised to \$161,500!

More Than Books

Enriching Lives and Inspiring Minds

Located at 309 North Market Street, the East Palestine Memorial Public Library was built on this property in 1959, but library service first began in the town in 1920 with the first public library established in 1934. It is a municipal public library overseen by a seven-member Board of Trustees appointed by village council.

Tamra J. Hess, Library Director, shared the library's mission statement: "The East Palestine Memorial Public Library provides materials, services, programs, technology and meeting spaces to meet the needs of all members of the community. The library upholds the principles of intellectual freedom and the public's right to know by providing people of all ages with guidance and access to educational, informational, cultural and recreational collections which reflect all points of view."

In 2020, the library joined with four other libraries in Columbiana County to create the PLUS (Public Libraries United in Service) Consortium. The consortium shares a computer system and library catalog, allowing access to a larger collection for each community. Interlibrary loan services provided through Search Ohio and Ohiolink, enables borrowing from large metropolitan libraries, colleges and universities throughout the state. Situated on the state line, East Palestine's library also serves nearby Beaver County, PA residents.

"Our main focus is promoting literacy to the community. And that's achieved through access to reading materials and many formats, including access to databases Libby and Hoopla that allow access to ebooks and digital audiobooks," explains **Noreen McBride**, Assistant Director/Youth Services Librarian. "We also offer preschool storytime, a toddler play group, an afterschool program for school-age children, a homeschool program, a tween and teen program and family events. Book clubs and programs for adults on a wide variety of topics are also presented throughout the month."

The Friends of the Library organization meets throughout the year and holds two annual book sales and a silent auction to raise funds to help provide services and programming.
