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Exciting Progress at East Palestine Park

Phase 2 Begins June 16

The revitalization of East Palestine Village Park is gaining momentum as we move into the highly anticipated second phase of the \$25 million renovation project. With Phase 1 nearly complete and essential permits now secured from the Ohio Department of Health, we are thrilled to announce that construction on Phase 2 will officially begin on June 16.

This phase marks a major milestone in the park's transformation and includes early site work for the future aquatic center. Residents can expect to see immediate progress starting with the mobilization of crews, safety fencing installation and demolition of the existing sports courts.

While this work may temporarily limit access to certain areas, we want to assure our residents that the park as a whole will remain open throughout the summer, fall and winter. The Community Center and other amenities will reopen as demolition concludes, and we'll provide weekly updates via the Village Facebook page and East Palestine Information platforms. New EP Council and EPCIC Member Appointed

Meet Erin Stauffer and Tim Blythe

The Village of East Palestine Council is made up of six elected members, serving overlapping terms of four years. Whenever there are vacancies, new members are appointed to fill the open positions.

Erin Stauffer was sworn in as the newest member of the East Palestine Village Council, replacing **Jessica Rocco**, who resigned in April. She also fills the Recreation, Parks and Cemetery Committee chair position.

Stauffer is a 2002 graduate of Youngstown State University with a BA in Psychology. She has spent over 20 years in social services including the supervision and administration of child welfare, inhome support for youth with mental health diagnoses and is now employed at the Columbiana County Juvenile Court as a child advocate. After moving to the village in 2011, she has grown to love the area. Her husband was born and raised in East Palestine, her daughter is a 2021 graduate from East Palestine High School, and her 9-year-old son is in the 3rd grade at East Palestine Elementary.

"There are exciting things happening in East Palestine, and I'm eager to be part of the progression of our village, "says Stauffer. "I want people to see that East Palestine is worth investing in. I highly value our small-town atmosphere and the wonderful community we have here. I am committed to setting the path to a positive future for the people of our village."

The EPCIC is a 501(c)(3)-charitable non-profit corporation created by the Village of East Palestine to lead economic development efforts for the community. The focus of EPCIC activities is to share positive messaging through the **epohio.org** website and EP newsletter, promote economic recovery and downtown revitalization and develop locations for business growth.

Recent Progress Recap

Phase 1 has seen exciting developments in recent weeks:

- · Sand volleyball court installation completed.
- · New patio furniture installed and ready for use.
- Final light poles installed, trees cleared, topsoil spread.
- Court fencing, sidewalk finishing and dog park parking lot paving are underway.
- The amphitheater, while slightly delayed due to material sourcing, is expected to have a new timeline next week.


Village Manager Antonio Diaz-Guy also confirmed that memorial plagues, rocks and Rainbow Dreamland's wooden memorial planks will be carefully preserved and respectfully relocated throughout the park after construction.

Phase 2 is currently projected to conclude by Summer 2026, bringing us another step closer to a fully modernized and inclusive recreational space for all residents to enjoy.

This project hasn't been without its challenges – from budget revisions to material delays – but thanks to ongoing collaboration between the village, community leaders and Norfolk Southern, real progress is happening. We remain committed to transparency and public input as the transformation continues.

As a safety precaution, Rainbow Dreamland will close on June 15 and remain closed throughout the duration of Phase 2. We know how much these spaces mean to residents, and we're committed to preserving these memories while we update our facilities and build towards our future.

The parking lot between the current tennis courts and the existing pool building will serve as the primary work and laydown area.

Tattooing with Heart in East Palestine

For **Lenny Glavan**, owner of HammerNink, tattooing is more than art – it's a deeply personal experience. Born and raised in East Palestine, Lenny has recently opened a private studio on East Taggart Street that focuses on connection, creativity and community.

"I redesigned my profession around how I could best serve people," he says. "Tattooing takes me away from the world, and this space lets me invite others into that escape."

Lenny's studio isn't your typical walk-in shop. HammerNink is appointment-only, offering a one-on-one environment where clients can relax, have a cup of coffee and collaborate on meaningful designs. "It's not just about what you want inked – it's about who you are," Lenny explains. "I want to understand your story and help you wear it proudly."

A second-generation entrepreneur and former builder, Lenny draws on his creative roots – watching his father design and build custom homes and his grandmother's music and artistic legacy – to fuel his craft. His tattoos are custom-designed with an eye toward longevity and personal meaning. "Tattooing is forever," he says. "I want to make sure it's done right."

Today, Lenny is known for his versatile style, blending American traditional, realism, black and gray, and bold color work. But it's not just his skill that sets him apart – it's his ability to listen. "I always want people to leave with something they're excited about and feel proud of," he explains. "If someone comes in with a general idea, I try to bring that to life in a way that fits them perfectly."

Now entering his 18th year in the business, Lenny proudly serves as a village council member and views his studio as a symbol of the town's revival. "The building is owned by my friend **Tommy Figley**, and he asked if I would like to share the space with **Jessie Wince** of Cuttin' Loose Family Hair Shop. It's a three-way win, and I think this type of multi-use collaboration could work at other properties downtown. East

Honoring 130 Years of Service and Sacrifice

East Palestine Firefighters Memorial Service

On Wednesday, June 4, 2025, the East Palestine Volunteer Firefighters Association hosted the 130th annual Firefighters Memorial Service at the Clark Street Fire Station. This solemn tradition, first held in 1894, honors the dedicated men and women who gave 20 years or more of service to the East Palestine Fire Department – whether as firefighters, EMTs or auxiliary members – standing as a lasting tribute to duty, sacrifice and community.

This year, 96 names were read during the ceremony, including the most recent addition with the passing of retired firefighter **James Collela**. Each name represents a life spent in selfless service –

individuals who routinely sacrificed time with their families to protect others, often missing family milestones, meals and moments to respond to emergency calls, train and serve.

The ceremony included time-honored traditions and heartfelt tributes. Fire Department Chaplain Mark McTrusty delivered the invocation and benediction, while Chief Keith Drabick read the Fireman's Prayer and the Honor Roll. Bagpiper Leslie Knox offered a moving performance, and Battalion Chief Brian Rutledge provided the welcoming and final call home. Battalion Chief Josh Foster performed the tolling of the bell – a ceremonial act signifying each member has answered their final call. This bell tradition is deeply rooted in fire service culture, symbolizing the end of duty and a return to eternal rest. At the service's conclusion, a final 2-8 (Signal 28) bell call rang out, signifying returning to quarters.

This enduring tradition is more than a remembrance – it is a reflection of gratitude. The Village of East Palestine proudly honors those who gave so much of themselves in service to others and pledges never to forget their sacrifice.
