President Biden Visits East Palestine

On Friday, February 16, a little more than a year after the Norfolk Southern train derailment, President Biden visited the Village of East Palestine. He toured the site with Mayor Trent Conaway and Fire Chief Keith Drabick and received a briefing from the Environmental Protection Agency on the continuing response and recovery efforts before holding a press conference.

Mayor Trent Conaway had the opportunity to speak on behalf of the village and noted, "Our village has faced many challenges, but as a community, we have shown resilience. We will not be defined by this single event, rather our response to it and our perseverance. President Biden, your long awaited visit to our village today allows us to focus on the things we agree with. Acknowledging this disaster should have never happened. Address the long time health concerns and the economic growth of the village, and ensure this never happens again to another community."

"Our goal is to be collaborative and proactive, collectively taking control of what we can shape for a stronger future. ... We are committed to seizing every opportunity for growth, enhancing our community's strength and resilience through initiative and perseverance. Here in East Palestine, we are rooted in pride, tradition, and unwavering in our drive for progress and to determine the outcome of any obstacle. I thank you all for coming here today and God bless East Palestine and the United States."

Critical Safety Information with RapidSOS

Enhancing Access for First Responders

A new intelligent safety platform has been deployed as part of a partnership between Norfolk Southern Corporation and RapidSOS that will help meet Rail



Safety Act regulations and deliver essential data directly into the hands of first responders when they need it most.

Prior to the partnership, emergency dispatchers had to manually search online databases and verbally relay critical information to field responders. The RapidSOS platform securely links over 500 million devices, apps, and sensors to more than 15,000 911 and field responder agencies. The partnership will leverage that network to help provide critical information and capabilities to first responders, including:

- Train cargo contents with details by train car
- Hazardous materials information and emergency response standards and best practices
- Ability to digitally escalate for mutual aid to surrounding agencies
- Online learning, support, and training at no cost to first responders

"Thanks to RapidSOS and Norfolk Southern for coming together to make this information widely accessible," noted Fire Chief Keith Drabick, "and I challenge all the other class one railroads to do the same. This software will get critical information to first responders faster, helping them respond quickly, save lives, and keep our communities safe."

EPA Progress Report

Highlights from the EPA's February newsletter include:

Backfilling Excavated Areas

Backfilling operations in Car Scrapping Area 4 are now complete. Over the last few weeks, as many as 100 trucks a day delivered clean stone and gravel into this excavated area where it was then graded and leveled.

Easing Taggart Street Traffic Restrictions

Truck traffic on E. Taggart Street will decrease with the completion of major backfilling operations and traffic controls will be reduced, including fewer cones and signage. The speed limit will remain at 15 mph to ensure both community and worker safety while site restoration and other work continue.
